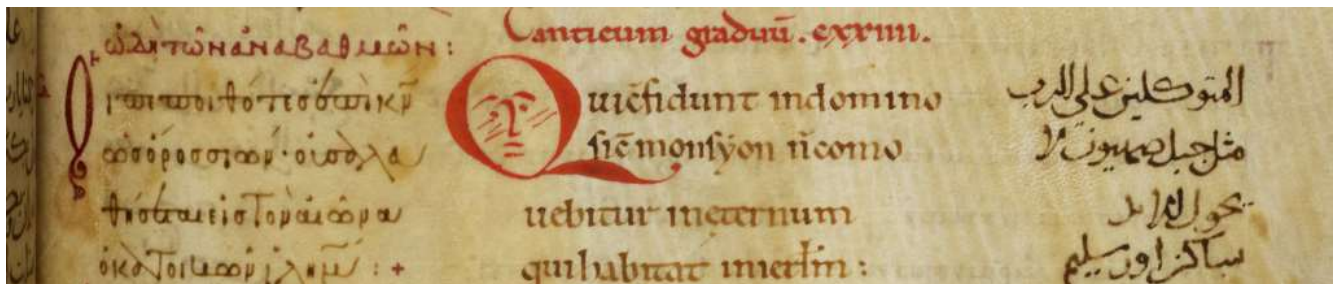

A consistent, global education demand: our vision

"The assumption that we live in a secularized world is false. The world today, with some exceptions, is as furiously religious as it ever was, and in some places more so than ever." (Peter Berger).

In our present-day society a strong interest for religion has returned: according to the data of the Pew Research Center, the percentage of non-believers is set to fall from 16.4% to 13.2% in 2050.

Philosophy study programmes are often designed in an agnostic way – as if God didn't exist – and do not consider the growing interest in religion, both globally and among philosophy students in particular. Furthermore, in most philosophy study programmes philosophy is studied only through issues and problems while a study of the history of philosophy is neglected.

Last but not least, the study of the millennium-long history of dialogue between philosophy and religions (in ancient Greek philosophy, Jewish philosophy, Christian philosophy, Islamic philosophy, Reformed philosophy, etc.), does not appear to be offered in any university programme, despite the study being fundamental for creating and sustaining dialogue between cultures and faiths in the future.

The Master's in Philosophy, Theology and Religions fills all these gaps. This unique programme takes heed of the mutual relationship between religions and philosophy both from a historical and theoretical point of view.

Curriculum: chronological and thematic modules

The Online Master's in Philosophy, Theology and Religions' curriculum is divided into 6 modules in chronological and thematic order. This system not only grants learners the rare opportunity to situate philosophical topics within a broader historical timeline, but also encourages more frequent feedback and dialogue amongst peers and with their tutors. The following is a broad outline of the curriculum students will study during the program

Application and scholarships: target Applicants and administrative fees

All applications must be submitted online until:

- 30 April (or late registration until 31 August) for the autumn semester
- 30 November (or late registration until 31 January) for the spring semester

The tuition fee per semester (including exams and use of the Moodle learning platform) is CHF 810 for student's resident in Switzerland and CHF 1110 for student's resident abroad. For online registration, a one-time registration fee will be added.

The Faculty of Theology of Lucerne has recently created a PhD (Dr. Phil. in Theological Studies) for which students holding this master's degree would be ideal.
