Exploitation of the concept of **functioning**

Functioning = health & lived health

- *biological health* the body functions and structures that constitute a person's intrinsic health state
- *lived health* a person's actual performance of simple and complex activities in interaction with their environment, other health conditions and personal factors

It enables a full-circle understanding of health, **integrating both medical and environmental perspectives** to address the complete spectrum of health needs and experiences.




It calls upon the resource of a full range of disciplines, comprising the **biomedical**, **clincial**, **and socio humanistic sciences**.


