The Enrolment session was useful in this aspect in helping us understand the registration process and how to register for courses.
<b>Information on university</b> Location, size, infrastructure	The university is small, but conveniently located beside the university. The view is great, and I enjoyed taking my lunch out to picnic. There is food around the university, like Mensa, Co-op, etc.

Generally, I had no problems with the difference in language as most people spoke English, but it was good to know German when grocery shopping or travelling.

Some modules are heavier than others, although I took a good combination. The professors are skilled in the subject they taught, and the reading material was not too difficult.
<b>Assistance at the university</b> Student advisors, Mobility Office, mentors, contact with other students	Student mentors (Anna) and staff at the mobility office (Ms Alice) were very helpful. Faculty staff (Madeline) were also quick to reply emails. However, it would have been good to know of the confirmed exam dates at an earlier time. There was some delay in release of the exam schedule for students who requested early exams.
