<p>General impression Please describe your stay in 4-5 sentences</p>	<p>Luzern is arguably the most beautiful city in Switzerland, always with something to see and do. Though I think this would have been a great option if I had applied a little earlier.</p> <p>In the end, I stayed in shared accommodation that I found on WG-Zimmer with some other Swiss students. This made my experience even better as they were able to show me the local spots and I got a great sense of the Swiss culture.</p>
<p>Public transportation Train, bus, accessibility of university buildings</p>	<p>The public transport system in Switzerland is very efficient and comfortable. I caught the train quite often to visit a friend in Lausanne and always used the Gleis 7 card, as well as the half-fare card for every other journey. Unfortunately I lost something on the train that was never returned to me, but I heard this is a rare occurrence. The University was very easy to find, has a great library, and I lived a short 10 minute walk away so I had no issues with accessibility and attendance.</p>
<p>Prearrangements Registration for courses, language tests, academic records</p>	<p>Registration for courses was very straight forward as I completed it all online. Also, the UNILU portal website is very easy to use. I chose to take courses that were in English only, so I didn't have to complete any language tests. However, the number of courses available in English was somewhat limited for my area of studies (business and Psychology). Nonetheless, I really enjoyed all the political sciences subjects I took and it increased my interest in this field.</p>
<p>Information on the university Location, size, infrastructure</p>	<p>The University is very centrally located right next to the train station and major shopping area, which I thought was very useful. In terms of size, compared to my Universi-</p>

<p>Studying at the university Content of lectures, credits, assessments</p>	<p>Every lecture/seminar I had was well prepared and interesting. Unlike my home university, I was surprised to find that I didn't have to do any major exams for my seminar courses, but instead an assignment, essay or presentation which I preferred. I have to note that my favorite subject was Personality and Politics, which took a very interesting perspective on the interaction between media, voters and politicians and was very appropriate with the recent Trump election.</p>
<p>Assistance at the university Mobility Coordinator, International Relations Office, student advisors, mentors, contact with other students</p>	<p>All the communication with mobility coordinator I had was pleasant and helpful, as The mobility coordinator was able to answer any questions I had and was very patient in waiting for me to send my new residence permit card which took longer than expected.</p>

I usually used the website 'transferwise' to transfer money from AUD to CHF to pay my rent, but I also owned a Credit Suisse account which was very helpful to pay for everyday expenses in Switzerland.</p>
