Moot Court Coach (25% / 50%)

Master students at the Faculty of Law of the University of Lucerne regularly participate successfully in leading international moot court competitions. We are looking for a Moot Court Coach to support our students in succeeding in the *Nelson Mandela World Human Rights Moot Court Competition* ([NMWHRC](#)) and the *WTO law Moot Court Competition* ([emc2](#)).

The position can be filled with one coach assisting both moot courts (50 %) or with two coaches assisting one moot court respectively (each 25 %). Please state your preferences in your application.

Your responsibilities:

The task of the moot court coach is to lead the students through the written and oral phase of the moot courts in close collaboration with the Faculty members responsible for the moot courts, namely Prof. Martina Caroni, Prof. Nicolas Diebold and PD Mira Burri. This entails:

- motivating, interviewing and selecting students for participation in the moot court;
- instructing the students on how to write a legal submission and teaching legal writing skills;
- organizing and leading practice pleadings with the teams;
- attending the pleading competitions in Geneva and other venues in Europe.

Your assets and skills:

- experience with Moot Court competitions, but not necessarily the emc2 or NMWHRC;
- above average university degree in law (MLaw, J.D.), with experience in public international law, preferably human rights and/or international economic law; a postgraduate qualification in law is an advantage but not a requirement;
- excellent command of the English language, including writing and oral presentation skills; a command of the German language is an advantage but not a requirement;
- ability to inspire and motivate students and to be a team leader;
- ability and willingness to work collaboratively and collegially with students and colleagues.

Your opportunities:

- highly interesting and rewarding work experience;
- flexible working hours;
- excellent working conditions, both in terms of office and team atmosphere;
- possibility to write a doctoral thesis (PhD) as a doctoral student at the University of Lucerne and to develop research interests in the field of international human rights and/or international economic law.
